Outback

The term outback refers, generally, to inland areas, more remote semi-desert of the Australian continent. The outback is also indicated with expressions like the red heart of Australia or the Red Centre, because of the soil rich in iron and then reddish color. For the 90%, the "Terra Australis" is Hill uncultivable because of arid terrain typical of the outback.

Only 2% of Australians would be indigenous. The 90% is descended from Europeans, including many Irish and Italian immigrants. The 8% is of Asian descent, especially the new generation of immigrants from Southeast Asia and the Middle East.

The fauna

Australian fauna is characterized by particular species, such as the monotremes, marsupials (kangaroos, koalas and Wombats), freshwater crocodiles and salt water and the dingo. Among the birds are the EMU, the budgies wavy, the Black Swan, the Australian Eagle etc. The country of Australia is the most poisonous snakes in the world. Rabbits are one of the major scourges for Australian agriculture, after the introduction from Britain.
